Informal waste picker

Thong is a trailblazer in the world of recycled waste. With a keen eye for valuable discarded items, she buys and sells steel, aluminum, and plastic bottles to earn a living for herself and her six-member family who live the village of Nongduang Thong. Her daughters work as shop assistants, her son is an air condition mechanic, and her son-in-law joins her in the business by buying waste.

Every day, Thong rises early and tries to be on the road by 10:00 am to buy recycled waste from households and other sources in the Chanthabuly and Sikhottabong districts. She then sells them at a nearby shop in Khualuang village. However, the COVID-19 pandemic disrupted her routine, leaving her struggling to earn money and provide for her family.

Thong also faces many others obstacles such as stiff competition from sellers in neighboring countries, who offer factory prices, and injury while sorting items from bins. Despite the challenges, she is determined to succeed and is always looking for ways to improve.
