1. MESSAGE FROM DELEGATION LEADS

On behalf of the Cambodian delegation, I would like to extend my congratulation to the ESCAP, ADB, and Ministry of Trade and Industry of Singapore, for organizing this 10th Asia-Pacific Trade Facilitation Forum. We thank you for inviting the Cambodian delegation to this important event on trade facilitation. We look forward to exchanging with partners from the Asia-Pacific region on best practices, strengthening of trade relations, and enhancing of the resilience of international supply chains in times of pandemic to better support sustainable economic recovery and development in the region.

The acceleration of international trade and Cambodia's integration into global supply chains have been fundamental drivers in the Kingdom's continued economic expansion and growth. At the same time, this also means the country needs to make cross-border trade easier, quicker, and less costly while ensuring revenue collection efficiency.

In this regard, the Cambodian government identified trade facilitation priorities and implemented various reforms, particularly through digitizing trade processes.

Indeed, Cambodia has made remarkable improvements in using modern information and communication technologies (ICT) to simplify and automate cross-border trade procedures. The areas of progress include for example, the adoption and application of modern ICT to trade-related services, including customs risk management, customs automation, national single window, and certificates of origin.

These improvements are good signs showing the government's commitments to the World Trade Organization's (WTO) Trade Facilitation Agreement (TFA), which was ratified by the government in 2016. Today, Cambodia has notified the following measures as C items: (1) notification, (2) pre-arrival processing (3) authorized operators, (4) border agency cooperation, (5) national single window, and (6) transit.

Further, Cambodia established its National Committee on Trade Facilitation (NCTF) in 2020 to facilitate smooth and effective implementation of the TFA. This inter-agency mechanism enables, Customs, other government agencies and the private sector stakeholders to participate in a structured dialogue to facilitate and monitor the implementation of the TFA commitments.

One recent achievement of the NCTF is the development of the Roadmap on Trade Facilitation 2022-2025, laying out the progress of the WTO-TFA implementation and a future work plan. We have thus far run two NCTF meetings, marking important steps in further facilitating trade across borders as it allowed its government and private sectors members, as well as development partners, to review and discuss the work progress of the NCTF, the implementation progress of the Action Plan 2022-2023 of the Trade Facilitation Roadmap 2022-2025, as well as the way forward to fully implement Cambodia's TFA commitments. The priorities are the TFA provisions notified as Category C items, the implementation of which requires financial and technical assistance and support.

Taking this opportunity, I would like to stress that Cambodia is very much looking forward to working with all interested parties, including development partners, to further amplify the gains from their support in trade facilitation reforms in Cambodia.

H.E. Sopheak joined MoC in 1992 and was promoted as Director of ASEAN and International Organizations Department in 1999 after which he has assumed many key roles as, among others, trade negotiator for Cambodia's integration into ASEAN, ASEAN Plus-One FTAs, and the World Trade Organization (WTO). He was promoted as Director General of International Trade, MoC in 2007 and moved to work as Director General of the General Directorate for Trade Support Services in 2014, where he has been promoting the implementation of trade reform agenda and trade facilitation, including but not limited to, development of online business registration, certification of origin, and online trademarks applications, etc. H.E. Mr. Sok Sopheak serves as Secretary of State since 2018 and has been the Cambodia's Trade Negotiation Committee (TNC) lead in trade negotiations on the Regional Comprehensive Economic Partnership (RCEP) which was signed on November 15, 2020. He was also Cambodia's lead negotiator for the Cambodia-China Free Trade Agreement (CCFTA) which was signed on October 12, 2020.

Under the ASEAN-EU project ARISE Plus Cambodia, Kamrang provides technical advisory support to the set-up of the National Committee of Trade Facilitation (NCTF) and its operation and functioning, including support to the NCTF secretariat in preparing, conducting, and following up on meetings of the NCTF and its sub-committees as well as support the coordination, implementation, and monitoring of trade facilitation commitments to the WTO TFA. She also advises and coordinates with the NTR Secretariat to support the inclusion of up-to-date information in the NTR, supports the institutional and human capacity development to enhance the NTR.

4. PROGRESS UPDATES ON TRADE FACILITATION IN CAMBODIA

In recent years, Cambodia has seen significant increase in its international trade volume. This growth, alongside a steep increase in technological development and advancements in the fourth industrial revolution, represent key drivers in the country's economic development, integration, and globalization.

In 2004, the country became a member of the World Trade Organization (WTO) and has ever since undertaken major economic and trade reforms and secured growth as an engine for pro-poor development. Growth has been sustained at high rates (pre-Covid, around 7.1% in 2019) over the last decade, leading to Cambodia's graduation to lower middle-income country status in 2016. The country is highly integrated into the global economy.

Under the WTO, Cambodia ratified the Protocol regarding the amendment of the Marrakesh Agreement to include the WTO Trade Facilitation Agreement (WTO TFA) into Annex 1A of the Marrakesh Agreement. In addition, Cambodia submitted the ratification document to the WTO on 16 December 2015 and on 12 February 2016 to promote Cambodia's international trade competitiveness and improve trade facilitation. Cambodia joined the WTO as the 69th country and the eighth least developed country that have ratified the WTO TFA.

In compliance with Section 3 of Article 23 of the WTO-TFA, which requires each member state to establish or retain an existing National Trade Facilitation Committee to facilitate and monitor the implementation of the provisions of this Agreement, the Royal Government has established the National Committee on Trade Facilitation (NCTF) through Sub-Decree No. 18 ANKr. BK, dated February 26, 2020. The Secretariat of NCTF sits at the General Department of Customs and Excise (GDCE) of Cambodia.

To date, Cambodia has officially notified the WTO Committee seven times. The country has reported overall compliance with the agreement's provisions which are organized into three categories. 82.8% of the provisions are categorized in Category A and do not require external implementation assistance. Category B comprises 1.7% of the provisions that require additional time for their implementation. Finally, category C includes 15.5% of the provisions that require technical assistance and capacity building from financed member countries or development partners. The C measures are: (1) notification, (2) pre-arrival processing (3) authorized operators, (4) border agency cooperation, (5) national single window, and (6) transit.

As a least-developed country, Cambodia has enjoyed the high level of support on technical assistance and capacity-building initiatives from development organizations. We continue to welcomes the cooperation of development partners who wish to work with us in further progressing our commitments under the WTO TFA.
